

**Millsaps College and Mississippi Community and Junior Colleges
Articulation Guide for Transfer Students**

Statement of Purpose:

Millsaps College and the Mississippi Community and Junior Colleges (MCJC) hereby enter into the following agreement governing the matriculation of MCJC students to Millsaps College. This contract shall commence immediately upon execution of the agreement, and shall continue until such time as either or both institutions wish to terminate it. This agreement sets forth the terms and conditions of students' transfer from all MCJC campuses to Millsaps College.

Terms and Conditions:

In order to facilitate and improve the transfer process for our mutual students, MCJC and Millsaps College hereby enter into the following agreement:

- MCJC students who follow the recommended program of study and who meet all other admission requirements shall be eligible for admission to Millsaps.
- Millsaps and MCJC have developed the following transfer and course equivalency guide, utilizing common MCJC numbers. By creating these guides, Millsaps and MCJC assure students that courses listed in said guide are freely transferable between Millsaps and MCJC.
- This agreement shall be reviewed on an annual basis or any time program changes are to be made by either institution. Any program changes will be identified and incorporated into subsequent agreements. Representatives from Millsaps and MCJC will meet or make contact during the Fall of each year to update course equivalencies, transfer guides, and transfer admission information to be used the subsequent academic year.

The MCJC Chief Academic Officers and the Millsaps College Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs/Dean of the College must all approve amendments to this agreement.

Agreement Continuation and Dissolution:

Any other modifications to this agreement may be made following written notice from the MCJC Chief Academic Officers and the Millsaps College Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs/Dean of the College, or their designees. Once this agreement is signed by the appropriate officials at MCJC and Millsaps, each is free to publicize this arrangement in a manner consistent with the agreement. This articulation agreement shall remain in effect until one or both institutions deem it necessary to terminate it.

This agreement shall be in effect immediately upon execution of the agreement.

About the General Education Curriculum at Millsaps College

The vision of Millsaps College affirms a dedication to engage students in a “transformative learning and leadership experience that results in personal and intellectual growth, commitment to good citizenship in our global society, and a desire to succeed and make a difference in every community they touch.” The Millsaps general education curriculum – what is referred to as the *Compass Curriculum* – is a key building block in that experience and offers all Millsaps students an exciting tool to find their best path to graduation and beyond! The *Compass Curriculum* is a student’s guide to a life-changing education – one that helps students choose their own path, provides students the tools to use along the way, and offers learning opportunities uniquely tailored to student goals! All Millsaps students must complete the *Compass Curriculum* specifically designed to develop the general abilities of a liberally educated person. The *Compass Curriculum* is made up of 12 requirements. Requirements 1, 10, and 12 may not be satisfied by transferring courses into Millsaps. Requirement 11 may be semi-satisfied by transferring in writing essays to Millsaps. Requirements 2-9 may be satisfied by transferring in coursework to Millsaps.

1. Foundational Knowledge in Problem Solving, Creative Practice, Integrative and Collaborative Learning, and Communication. This requirement may not be transferred into Millsaps.
2. Our Human Heritage I and II
3. Business Knowledge
4. Fine Arts
5. Mathematics
6. Non-Native Language
7. STEM
8. Natural World
9. Social World
10. Major Experience. This requirement may not be transferred into Millsaps.
11. Writing Proficiency. This requirement is semi-transferrable into Millsaps.
12. Writing Reflection. This requirement may not be transferred into Millsaps.

Many of the *Compass Curriculum* requirements may be transferred into Millsaps from any Mississippi Community College. Below details which MCJC courses may be used to satisfy *Compass Curriculum* requirements at Millsaps College:

Requirement 1: Foundational Knowledge

TRCS 1050 Discovery combines a problem-solving and collaborative focus with communication skills development to give transfer students a foundation in these key elements of the Millsaps education experience. Courses will explore a focused problem or theme relevant to a particular disciplinary field to develop problem solving, collaboration, and written and oral communication skills. This requirement may not be transferred into Millsaps.

Requirement 2: Our Human Heritage Part I and II

Our Human Heritage is a humanities-based, interdisciplinary exploration of human experience and world cultures throughout history, considering intellectual development, artistic expression, social and cultural evolution, from pre-history until the present. The requirement will develop skills for seeking,

understanding, and interpreting cultural phenomena across numerous human contexts. Two classes in different subjects will complete this requirement. Community College classes to choose from are below.

Requirement 4: Explorations in Fine Arts

In the Exploration of Fine Arts, students are equipped with tools that help them explore the aesthetic dimension of human life. This requirement introduces students to the rich artistic realms associated with images, sounds, objects, movement, and/or language. Students gain the ability to evaluate and critique artistic works. Students will also develop their powers of artistic expression, performance, and/or discernment. One of the following Community College courses will complete this requirement. In addition, although they are not listed below, any applied music coursework the equivalent of 4 semester credit hours from a Mississippi Community College will also satisfy this requirement.

Requirement 5: Explorations in Mathematics

In the Exploration of Mathematics, students study and solve pure and applied mathematical problems from both visual and analytic perspectives. The courses that satisfy this requirement develop the student's ability to convert conceptual information into problems that can be solved using standard mathematical and geometrical tools to then solve the problems and interpret the results. Requirement 6: Explorations in a Non-Native Language

In the Exploration of Non-Native Language, students demonstrate proficiency in a non-native language. This requirement emphasizes language study as a vital means to understanding other cultures,

literatures, historical perspectives, and human experiences. Students will become more aware of their own native language and culture, and they will enhance their communication, reasoning, and thinking skills. Courses fulfilling this requirement must maintain at least 3 contact points per week. Completion of the second semester of any of the following languages from a Mississippi Community College the will satisfy this requirement.

Requirement 10: The Major Experience

The Major Experience is an experiential learning graduation requirement that ensures every Millsaps student directly connects with the College's vision of producing transformative leaders who will have positive impacts across the street and around the globe. The Major Experience requirement can be satisfied with an approved 4-hour Millsaps course or approved experiential equivalent. Students will engage in a transformative learning or leadership experience on campus, or will apply their Millsaps education to an experience off campus. Examples include the following. This requirement is non-transferable.

- Study abroad
- Field-based course
- Community-engaged coursework
- Undergraduate research
- Honors project
- Ford Fellowship
- Internship with reflective component

Requirement 11: Writing Proficiency

Demonstration of writing proficiency through the Millsaps Writing Proficiency Portfolio is a graduation requirement. The Writing Proficiency Requirement consists of three parts as indicated below. This requirement is semi-transferable (see "special note" below), and the Writing Program will work with transfer students to create a pathway for completion by graduation.

1. Complete the Writing Portfolio by submitting four essay papers.
2. Write a 2-4 page introduction to the Writing Portfolio.
3. Complete a "wild card" document reflecting an element of the student's communication development. This document can be written, oral (recording/video), or visual in nature; the only requirement is that it can be shared in digital form.

Special Note for Transfer students: The categories for essay submission may vary according to the student's academic record prior to attending Millsaps College. Students transferring in at the junior or senior level are allowed to substitute one paper written for a course at a previous college or university as one of their four essays. Transfer students with questions about the portfolio should speak with the Director of Writing and Teaching at Millsaps College to ascertain what papers to submit. For more information, consult the Writing Program at Millsaps College webpage or visit the Writing Program office in John Stone Hall on the Millsaps College campus.

Requirement 12: Writing Reflection on Liberal Studies

A critical reflective paper must be completed during the senior year on the value of the Millsaps Experience in conjunction with either the department's senior seminar or another major course. This requirement is nontransferable.

Millsaps *Compass Curriculum* Policies:

While the list above is substantial, it may not be all encompassing. If there is a course that you believe may satisfy a particular requirement, please contact the Office of Records at Millsaps College to review course descriptions.

If you have completed a MCJC course that is articulated into Millsaps College but Millsaps does not have the same equivalent course, the course will still count toward the *Compass Curriculum*. However, instead of coming in as a specific course with a number, it will come into Millsaps with a course code of CMPS. If you have completed a MCJC course that does not satisfy a *Compass Curriculum* requirement, it may transfer to Millsaps as an elective course (with a course code of TRAN) contributing to the credit hours needed for graduation. Remedial/developmental or technical/vocational courses will not be included for transfer in this articulation agreement.

Transfer courses must be a C- or higher, and they are recorded on the Millsaps transcript as "TR" therefore not impacting the Millsaps' institutional grade point average.

Each requirement must be satisfied individually. Courses may not double count; for example, while some of the same MCJC courses show under both STEM and Understanding the Natural World, the same course may not be used to satisfy both requirements. The only exception to this is Economics. The Economics classes that may contribute to both "Explorations in Business Knowledge" and "Explorations in Social World" have been asterisked () earlier in this document.
